## Chairman's Report

## Happy New Year Rocky Mountain Chapter!

As in prior newsletters, I've provided a little information about NCRS National's current "year of" editions of the Corvette. So, this is the "Year of the 1969," which was introduced 50 years ago and will be recognized this July at the National Convention in Greenville, South Carolina. As you know, there was a major change to the Corvette's styling when the '68 was introduced. The Mako-

Shark theme continued however there were a few noticeable changes in the outward appearance of the Corvette for '69. One was that the pushbutton door release in the '68 was removed and integrated into a release-handle that continued through the rest of C3 production. Also "Stingray" was reintroduced (this time, one word) and was added to each front fender. The rectangle back-up lights in the '68 were integrated into the round taillights. A few other things that you won't find on a '68, or any other Shark, included a factory off-road exhaust system and bright trim on the fender louvers. On the interior, the key slot to start the car was moved from the dash to the steering column, which also took place on other GM models.

The width of the 15-inch diameter wheels was increased from 7 inches to 8 inches, however still shod with F70-15 tires. The big change not readily apparent is under the hood, where the venerable 327 cid small block was increased to 350 cid for '69. The 427 cid engine options were essentially the same as those offered in '68, however there was the all-aluminum ZL1 option offered in '69 with only two known versions sold (same engine as offered in the 69 ZL1 Camaros produced in '69). So rare is the ZL1, that in the more the 20 years of going to NCRS events I have yet to come across one. Let me know if you have ever run across one. Something interesting that I ran across is that Chevrolet apparently listed a 370 hp, LT-1 option small

block for production, however none were produced until the '70 model year.

As a result of delays in getting the '70 production launched ('69 production ran through December due to a strike), there were a lot more '69s built than Corvettes produced in '68 or '70 with 38,762 units sold (22,129 coupes, and 16,633 convertibles). So, there you have it, an overview of the '69 production information.

2020 Regional Update – we will be ramping up coordination this year in preparation of the Regional that will be in Loveland next year. Tom Hosea has agreed to be my co-chair for the event as Pete LaClair has moved out of state and was not able to continue as a co-chair. I look forward to working with Tom and appreciate his stepping up to help. So, stay tuned for additional information as we get the committees put together and start the coordinating process. By the time you read this we will likely have had another fun holiday party. Thanks to Jeff Roth, our activities chair for putting this and the rest of the year's activities together.

## NCRS Retirement Benefits are great!

The deadline for providing input to the newsletter is today, the last day of the year. Unfortunately, that's too soon to obtain end of year financial documents and get everything laid into Quickbooks. So, I'm not going to give you a 2018 financial wrap. Also, there would be no time for the Board to review and approve such financials. So, I'll wait for the next newsletter to provide that report. But, I can say things look good. No, I don't expect that we'll report a financial gain for the year. But, I do expect we'll see a very modest loss. We've done a good job of controlling expenses and we eliminated the financial straddle we saw last year with holiday party expenses not being booked into the same calendar year as their offsetting revenues.

A major threat we escaped in 2018 was that of re-tooling our chapter web site. The internet provider who hosted our site went out of business and we were left with a backup disk drive that was kaput. Bottom line, the RMC website was up the creek without a paddle! The board tasked me to research our alternatives. Bob Davis, our webmeister, was buried in works without the spare time to address the emergency. So, I turned to the NCRS National IT department. They helped us out IN SPADES! We were able to host our replacement site behind the NCRS National site as several other chapters have done. That ducks the cost of paying a third party to perform the website hosting function and it eliminates the need to register and maintain an internet domain name. Then, we took the approach of using Word Press to create the replacement website instead of doing a hand-rolled, full custom write of HTML code. Word Press is an incredible utility that generates website code in a vein similar to a spreadsheet. Last, we found an independent consultant skilled in using Word Press who worked with me to generate a replacement site. Bottom line, RMC was back up in the website business with a functional chapter site in roughly 30-days for less than \$500. I think we got lucky in dodging this financial bullet!

Currently, I am the website manager. There's not that much work associated with the job. But, all I've been doing is maintaining the original skeleton that was created. As we enter the new year, I'd like to pass the torch to someone else. Someone who has the time to devote to pruning and growing the chapter website. Plus, Bob Davis did an EXCELLENT job of keeping our site refreshed with pictures of recent chapter events. Word Press HAS the ability to craft nicely laid out multi-picture pages, but I just haven't gone there/done that. So, if you have experience with Word Press and website control consider taking this job. The NCRS retirement benefits are GREAT!!!
